

2022 Annual Action Plan - DRAFT

Introduction

The 2022 Annual Action Plan constitutes the third year of the 2020-2024 Five-year Consolidated Planning period.

Each year the City must submit an Annual Action Plan to the federal Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) describing the planned use of its CDBG award. The primary objective of CDBG is the development of viable urban communities through the provision of decent housing, a suitable living environment, and expanded economic opportunities for low and moderate-income individuals/families and communities. The Annual Action Plan describes the City's housing and community needs and the planned actions to address those needs. The City plans to submit the Annual Action Plan HUD by May 15, 2022, but no later than August 16, 2022, pending HUD notifying the City of its 2022 CDBG award.

As of the date of this draft plan the City has not been notified of its 2022 CDBG award amount. The City is using an estimated award amount of \$750,000.00. The City is also planning for the use of \$447,620 in carryover funds. Once notified of the award amount by HUD, any increase or decrease relative to the estimated allocation will be applied to the single-family housing rehabilitation program and the administration and planning activity (as not to exceed 20% of the award allocation amount).

The City plans to incur costs for 2022 CDBG activities prior to the award of funds. These costs will be limited to those that the City has found to be necessary for the efficient and timely performance of the CDBG program and the funded activity. Costs will not be incurred prior to the completion of the public comment period, and not prior to the approval of the Annual Action Plan by the City Council. Pre-award costs will not exceed one-half of the estimated award. Pre-award costs will be funded from the 2022 award only. Subsequent award years will not be impacted.

The City will utilize CDBG funds as well as other Federal, State and local resources, including its Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher Rental Assistance Contract, State Administered HOME funds, and local developer contributions to address housing and community development priority needs identified in the Consolidated Plan.

The Annual Action Plan identifies a variety of activities, including public services, public facility improvements, removal of architectural barriers, and housing activities the City proposes to undertake during the Program Year to meet underserved needs identified in the Consolidated Plan. In addition, the Action Plan discusses the actions the City will take to address: lead-based paint hazards; barriers to affordable housing; housing needs of households at or below the poverty level; and Fair Housing resource needs.

2. Summarize the objectives and outcomes identified in the Plan

The City will allocate investment of resources on a city-wide basis for Affordable Housing Programs such as the Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher and Housing Rehabilitation Program. In addition, rental and purchase units provided under the City's 10% Affordable Housing Goal will be offered on a City-wide basis.

Activities identified under the public service category and targeted to special needs populations will be offered on a city-wide basis and/or where resources can be coordinated with existing facilities or services.

The City will allocate resources to activities/programs proposed for the 2022 Program Year that are identified as a "high" priority and consistent with the strategies identified in the Consolidated Plan.

The City will continue to apply for funding and/or support applications by service providers to expand affordable housing opportunities as well as homeless assistance and supportive services consistent with the Consolidated Plan.

Affordable Housing — The Roseville Housing Authority will apply for additional Section 8 Housing Choice Vouchers, if made available, to increase the number of extremely low and very low-income households receiving rental assistance. The City will continue to implement the City's 10% Affordable Housing Goal to increase the number of rental and purchase units affordable to very low, low, and moderate income households; support private development of affordable housing using Low Income Housing Tax Credits (LIHTCs), and Tax Exempt Bond financing; utilize HOME (state) Program Income funds in order to continue to expand the City's Housing Rehabilitation Programs for low-income households.

Homeless — The City will continue its efforts to meet the underserved needs of the homeless population through participation in a county-wide Continuum of Care process.

Supportive Services — The City will continue its support of applications by public and private social service agencies to expand support services to help meet underserved needs. The City will provide CDBG funding for a variety of public services in Roseville.

3. Evaluation of past performance

This is an evaluation of past performance that helped lead the grantee to choose its goals or projects.

During the 2022 Program Year (PY) the City expended CDBG funds on eligible activities that primarily benefited low and moderate income persons. The City implemented programs to achieve its goals as specified in the Consolidated and Annual Action Plans by using CDBG funds for affordable housing and public services by focusing on the needs of the most vulnerable populations, which included seniors, the individuals and families who were homeless, and those at-risk of becoming homeless. Additionally, with the use of CDBG-CV funds, the City also made progress towards the goal of preventing, preparing for, and responding to the impacts of the COVID-19 virus.

Progress was made towards the improvement of the City's housing stock as a result of projects assisted through the Housing Rehabilitation Program, including lead-based paint hazard reduction work. Although the City planned to fund a project to revitalize a neighborhood park in a low-income area, it was determined that the project was ineligible due to its location in a floodway zone. Therefore, these funds were redirected to the upcoming program year to fund necessary ADA improvements to a local neighborhood pool. The City intends to make progress towards affordable housing production in the upcoming program year.

4. Summary of Citizen Participation Process and consultation process

Summary from citizen participation section of plan.

The City of Roseville's Housing Division is the lead agency responsible for the development of the Consolidated Plan and Annual Action Plan. The Housing Division is also the primary agency responsible for the administration and management of programs and projects covered by the Consolidated Plan and identified in the Annual Action Plan (Plan).

Throughout the preparation of the Annual Action Plan, City staff sought input and collected data for the Plan from interested citizens, housing providers, service providers, local agencies and non-profit organizations. The City encouraged others to participate in the development of the Plan via public notice and invitations to a public meeting to more than one hundred regional and local services agencies, non-profit organizations, city staff, and interested individuals.

A virtual public meeting was held in January 2022. For those unable to attend the public meetings, the invitation encouraged written comments be submitted.

The January 2022 meeting began the Action Plan process; the purpose of the Plan was discussed during this meeting. Those attending the meeting were encouraged to identify community needs and proposed strategies for meetings those needs. The meeting also discussed the 2022/2023 application for CDBG funding. Twenty staff from fourteen agencies attended this workshop.

Agencies present were: AMI Housing, City of Rocklin, Compassion Planet, Families on the Brink, HomeShare American River, KidsFirst, LifeSTEPS, Lighthouse, Placer County, Salvation Army, St Vincent de Paul, Stand Up Placer, The Gathering Inn, and Volunteers of America.

Applications for funding requests for the 2022 Program Year were accepted online. The City received \$435,980 in requests: eight requests for public services grants from seven agencies totaling \$119,980; and three requests for public facilities projects totaling \$316,000 in funding.

Funding for the public services category is subject to a 15 percent federal cap. According to the City's PY 2022 (estimated) allocation of \$750,000, plus 15% of program income received during the prior program year, this cap equates to \$131,293 that may be allocated towards the public services awards. Eleven of the eleven applications are recommended to receive their funding requests.

Narrative (optional)

The City of Roseville’s Housing Division is the lead agency responsible for the development of the Consolidated Plan. The Housing Division is responsible for administration of the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program, HOME funding, the Roseville Housing Authority and City housing programs such as the Owner-Occupied Housing Rehabilitation Program; in addition to programs and projects supporting affordable homeownership, housing stability and maintenance of affordable housing stock.

The mission of the Roseville Housing Division is to serve the citizens of Roseville by:

- Providing affordable housing opportunities in a safe environment.
- Revitalizing and maintaining neighborhoods.
- Forming effective partnerships to maximize social and economic opportunities.

Roseville is located in Northern California, north of Sacramento, in southwestern Placer County. The City’s geography is primarily rolling hills and grasslands. The City was originally a “railroad town” and in the early 1900’s was a major railroad service center. The railroad played a role in the development of early Roseville. Other factors that have impacted the City’s development have been the construction of Folsom Dam and completion of Interstate 80 in the 1950’s. These projects impacted Roseville’s growth by shifting the development of business, commercial, and residential development to “East Roseville”. The City has continued to grow outward in all directions. In addition to the city’s core, Roseville currently has ten specific plan areas and growth has provided a wide variety of residential, business, commercial and industrial development.

The majority of the City’s older, low-income housing stock and business/commercial areas are located in the City’s core, near the rail lines. Based on the 2011-2015 American Community Survey, HUD estimates that 30.24% of Roseville residents are at or below 80% of the Family Area

Median Income (AMI) for Placer County. This document refers to persons at or below 80% AMI as “low-income”. This Plan focuses on developing strategies to address the needs of low-income Roseville residents.

In preparing the Plan, the City consulted with various organizations located in Roseville and Placer County that provide services to the residents of Roseville. In many instances, these consultations are part of ongoing interactions between Roseville’s Housing Division and the agency or group described.

City of Roseville

1. City Council – Authorizes (at a public hearing) the submission of the Consolidated Plan and Annual Action Plan to HUD.
2. City of Roseville Development Services Department – Planning Division. Reviews CDBG- and HOME-funded development projects to determine whether proposed development activities comply with the General Plan and Zoning Code; responsible for drafting the Roseville General Plan 2035, adopted in 2020, including the Housing Element, which was updated and certified in 2021. The update has been cited throughout this Plan as the Housing Element of the General Plan 2021–2029.
3. City of Roseville Economic Development Department – Provides assistance with business needs such as starting or expanding a business, finding a site, or connecting with other City services.
4. Roseville Housing Authority – Addresses the housing needs of extremely low- and low-income residents in the City through a variety of programs including the Housing Choice Voucher Program.

County of Placer

1. Placer County Community Development Department – Planning Services Division-- Coordinates the housing programs and funding. Responsible for drafting the Placer County General Plan Housing Element, as well as an incentive program intended to encourage the development of new affordable housing units in the unincorporated areas.

2. Placer County Department of Health and Human Services – Behavioral Health Division-- Provides information regarding the needs of Placer County residents who have mental disabilities. Representatives of this division also participate in various Continuum of Care working groups.
3. Placer County Department of Health and Human Services – Public Health Division-- Provides information regarding the potential of lead-based paint hazards in the county.

Describe coordination with the Continuum of Care and efforts to address the needs of homeless persons (particularly chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans, and unaccompanied youth) and persons at risk of homelessness.

Significant aspects of the Consolidated Plan development process included consultations with the Homeless Resource Council of the Sierras (HRCS), the Nevada-Placer Continuum of Care (CoC), Placer Collaborative Network (PCN), and the Placer Consortium on Homelessness (PCOH). Efforts to address the needs of homeless persons are described in greater detail later in this Plan.

The PCOH, a regional planning group of the HRCS, addresses the needs of all homeless subpopulations, including: domestic violence victims; persons with mental illness, substance abuse, and HIV+/AIDS; veterans; and youth. Current and formerly homeless individuals attend PCOH meetings. Other representatives include members from the faith-based community, nonprofits, businesses, and City and County government. The consortium’s 10-Year Homeless Action Plan and its annual submissions to HUD reflect the demographics, needs and available shelter, housing, and services in all three HUD entitlement jurisdictions in order to provide a cohesive shelter system throughout the County. The Food Closet Collaborative coordinates the work of over 14 food closets in conjunction with the Placer County Food Bank.

Homeless Resource Council of the Sierras (HRCS) Governance Board

The HRCS, the Nevada-Placer Continuum of Care (CoC), Governance Board works toward developing a continuum of services where the ultimate goal is to prevent and eradicate homelessness in Nevada and Placer counties. Efforts are aimed at permanent solutions, and the range of services is designed to meet the unique and complex needs of individuals who are currently experiencing homelessness or are at risk of becoming homeless. The Governance Board responds to and implements HUD’s Policy and Program Priorities. The Governance Board also

oversees all planning processes, the regional planning groups, committees, and the CoC Program and Emergency Solutions Grants (ESG) application processes. A HRCS subcommittee, Outcomes and Measurements, administers the Rating and Ranking Committee and its process of ranking applications. Issues are framed at the board level; they are then considered by the three regional planning groups. Recommendations are sent back to the Governance Board, who makes the final decisions.

Regional Planning Groups

Three Regional Planning Groups are directly involved in CoC-wide planning activities including setting priorities, reviewing performance data, project review and selection, discharge planning, the Consolidated Application, conducting homeless counts, and 10-year plan coordination. Each addresses homelessness in its own area and then forwards that information to the Governance Board. The Placer Consortium on Homelessness (PCOH) covers the more populated western part of Placer County that includes Roseville, Rocklin, Lincoln, Loomis, Auburn, and the foothills. The Nevada County Coordinating Council addresses Nevada City, Grass Valley, North San Juan, Penn Valley, and Alta Sierra. The Tahoe Truckee Homelessness Group covers both counties in the greater North Lake Tahoe and Truckee region.

These regional planning groups ensure that homeless needs from all areas of the CoC are represented. The groups are very inclusive, and all those involved with homeless issues are recruited. The CoC supports currently or formerly homeless individuals in attending; extensive e-mail to listserv groups is used to reach out to all sectors of the CoC areas. The HRCS Board is representative of all areas of the CoC and all targeted homeless populations. The HRCS Board is currently in the process of splitting the two continuums back into Nevada County and Placer County, in an effort to maximize funding opportunities, but HRCS would remain the collaborative applicant and coordinator amongst the two Continuums of Care.

Outcomes and Measurements

The Outcomes and Measurements Committee addresses the CoC's overall outcomes, application ranking, as well as monitoring the writing of the homeless strategies plan. The Committee sets selection criteria and organizes the Rating and Ranking panels for specific funding sources such as the CoC Program and ESG funds. The Committee is responsible for developing performance measurements and reviews all CoC Program and ESG-funded projects on an annual basis. The Committee presents its work to the regional planning groups and the HRCS Governance Board.

The Outcomes and Measurements Committee uses a rating and ranking panel that is responsible for developing, implementing, and improving the Coordinated Assessment process and the ESG Written Standards for identifying areas where the CoC Program and the ESG Programs should be integrated. No jurisdiction within the two counties receives ESG funds directly from HUD; therefore, the agencies must apply to the California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) for ESG funds.



Introduction

During the five-year Consolidated Plan period, the City estimates receipt of \$700,000 annually in CDBG funds from HUD and \$50,000 annually in program income generated by previous CDBG funded activities. The City primarily uses CDBG funds for public services, housing and homeless activities and administrative costs. The table below provides a breakdown of anticipated CDBG funding over the first year of the planning period.

In addition to CDBG funding received directly from HUD, the City currently has approximately \$1,500,000 in State of California HOME funds (all Program Income) available for owner-occupied housing rehabilitation and administrative costs. Funds are also available for the First Time Home Buyer (FTHB) program for down payment assistance, should the program start up again in the future.

The City's CDBG and HOME funds are often coupled with local funds, allowing capital projects to compete for tax credits, bonds, and other state financing programs. An investment by the City makes projects more competitive under many funding programs. The City's public service grants are limited to \$15,000 to encourage programs to use CDBG as leverage for other funding sources.

The HUD CDBG Entitlement program and the State HOME program do not require matching funds. However, the City is committed to being as creative as possible to seek local, state, federal, and private resources to develop and deliver efficient and cost-effective projects.

If appropriate, describe publicly owned land or property located within the jurisdiction that may be used to address the needs identified in the plan

The City owns two pieces of surplus land which are in the process of being sold to affordable housing developers. One piece of land is located at the corner of Royer Street and Taylor Street, while the other is located on Oak Street. Both of these pieces of land are located in Downtown Roseville area, and as part of the City's Downtown Specific Plan, will be used for 100% affordable housing development.

Discussion

On April 2, 2020, the City was awarded an additional \$417,412 in CDBG-CV funds from the CARES Act to address the impacts of the COVID-19 virus. The CDBG-CV funds along with disencumbered "carryover" funds and program income were amended into the City's 2019 Annual Action Plan. Expenditures will continue through program year 2022.

Additionally, on September 11, 2020, the City was awarded an additional \$795,721 in CDBG-CV3 funds from the CARES Act to address the impacts of the COVID-19 virus. A portion of the CDBG-CV3 funds were amended into the City's 2019 Annual Action Plan, while the remaining portion (about \$250,000) of the CDBG-CV funds will be amended into the 2019 Plan upon Council approval. Expenditures will continue through program year 2022.

Describe the reasons for allocation priorities and any obstacles to addressing underserved needs

All projects address priority needs in the 2020-2024 Consolidated Plan. Applications were evaluated based on the following criteria: meeting a CDBG National Objective, eligible activity, performance under prior year grants, monitoring compliance, administrative capacity, project feasibility, and fiscal responsibility. Remaining funds were allocated to City projects that serve priority needs as identified in

the Consolidated Plan.

Community and local service providers identified the need for more affordable housing as a high priority for Roseville. The most significant obstacle to creating affordable housing is the high cost of development in the region and throughout California. Funding in support of affordable rental housing development is proposed for CDBG funding in 2022. This includes 60 Project Based Vouchers that were awarded to six different projects to help advance development of affordable housing. Additionally, the City will continue to work with affordable housing developers to increase housing opportunities available and affordable to low-income residents over the course of the five year Consolidated Plan.

Discussion

The City prioritizes the use of CDBG, HOME and other federal and State funding for the development and preservation of affordable housing serving low-income households and addressing homelessness. The City’s affordable housing programs include the Housing Choice Voucher program and the Owner-Occupied Housing Rehabilitation program. In addition, rental and purchase units are created under the City’s 10% Affordable Housing Goal.

AP-60 Public Housing – 91.220(h)

Introduction

The Roseville Housing Authority (RHA) administers the Housing Choice Voucher Program for both the City of Roseville and the City of Rocklin. The RHA administers 785 Roseville Housing Choice Vouchers which include 75 Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing (VASH) Vouchers, 33 Mainstream Vouchers, 75 Non-Elderly Disabled (NED) Vouchers and 125 Rocklin Vouchers. VASH Vouchers provide housing assistance to homeless veterans that is coupled with services provided by the Veterans Administration. Mainstream Vouchers are reserved for households with a disabled family member between the ages of 18 and 62. NED Vouchers are limited to families with a disabled head of household or spouse that is under age 63. The RHA does not own or operate public housing units.

The RHA acts in accordance with federal regulations relating to persons with disabilities. The RHA has implemented fair, thorough, and accessible reasonable accommodations request process. Private owners participating in the voucher program are expected to understand and comply with all federal, state, and local laws as they relate to nondiscrimination and accessibility for persons with disabilities.

Actions planned during the next year to address the needs to public housing

The RHA does not own or operate any public housing units.

Actions to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

The RHA does not own or operate public housing units. The agency administers the Housing Choice Voucher Program. RHA operates a Family Self-Sufficiency (FSS) Program for voucher holder. The FSS program has established partnerships with a variety of community resources and refers participants for services including pre- and post-secondary education, health care, child care, employment development, supported employment and small business development including micro-loans. The FSS Program encourages families to participate in financial wellness programs including financial literacy and credit repair with an emphasis on long-term financial stability for the purposes of homeownership.

If the PHA is designated as troubled, describe the manner in which financial assistance will be provided or other assistance

HUD has not designated the RHA as a troubled housing authority.

AP-65 Homeless and Other Special Needs Activities – 91.220(i)

Introduction

The City of Roseville actively participates in the Placer County Continuum of Care CA-515 (CoC) and the Homeless Resource Council of the Sierras (HRCS). HRCS is a regional planning group acting as the collaborative applicant for the Placer and Nevada County CoCs and documents the demographics of persons experiencing homelessness through the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS). Member agencies of the Placer CoC include: Placer County Adult System of Care, Placer County CalWORKs, The Gathering Inn, Volunteers of America, Enhanced Care Management, Whole Person Learning, Advocates for Mentally Ill Housing, Stand Up Placer, Placer Independent Resource Services, Project Go, City of Roseville, City of Rocklin, Tahoe/Truckee Health and Human Services, and the Sierra Foothills AIDS Foundation.

Describe the jurisdictions one-year goals and actions for reducing and ending homelessness including:

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

The City of Roseville is a member of the Placer County CA515 (CoC). The member agencies of the CoC take primary responsibility for outreach to homeless persons residing in the City. Member agencies include Placer County Adult System of Care, Placer County CalWORKs, The Gathering Inn, Volunteers of America, Enhanced Care Management, Whole Person Learning, Advocates for Mentally Ill Housing, Stand Up Placer, Placer Independent Resource Services, Project Go, City of Roseville, City of Rocklin, Tahoe/Truckee Health and Human Services, and the Sierra Foothills Aids Foundation. The City provides CDBG funds to several of these agencies to support this important work.

The City also participates in the Placer Collaborative Network (PCN), which was created to bring community leaders together to develop creative solutions for change surrounding homelessness. The organization provides on-the-ground projects, leadership development, linkages and referrals to services; and creative and collaborative solutions for the most pressing community issues in Placer County through collaboration, creativity and service.

The City supports the following outreach and assessment activities:

- Placer County Continuum of Care (CoC) administration of coordinated entry for all households who are entering the homeless system or are at risk of homelessness.
- CoC coordination of outreach to homeless households (especially unsheltered persons) to assess individual needs using a coordinated entry and common assessment tool; collection of information to determine the underlying issues and risk factors and develop a plan to address those issues
- Continuation of street outreach conducted by the Social Services Unit of the Police Department

and the Placer County Enhanced Care Management program

- Reduction of recidivism through system-wide implementation of evidenced-based practices known to effectively address trauma and address cycles into homelessness
- Address the emergency shelter needs of people living outside through increased street outreach and assessment of their health needs
- Implementation of a low and no-barrier approach to housing and outcome-based reporting that uses measurements to assess appropriate use of funds and program success

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

The City has identified affordable housing and addressing homelessness as its two top priority needs and goals for the 2020-2024 Consolidated Plan. The City supports the following activities with a combination of HUD CDBG funds, State funds and local funds when available:

- Provision of emergency shelter with a focus on case management and supportive services
- Transitional housing programs
- Rapid re-housing for persons at risk of homeless or who recently became homeless

Additionally, short-term strategies include but are not limited to the following:

- Expanding street outreach efforts to prioritize the needs of persons living outside, especially those whose health is compromised. These efforts are being extended through the Social Services Unit of the Police Department and the County's Whole Person Care program.
- Sustaining existing emergency shelter inventory and helping those in shelter exit to permanent housing through rental assistance and case management addressing specific barriers to obtaining and retaining housing. Through the Placer County Housing Coordinators, Roseville Housing vouchers, and the Whole Person Care staff noted above, more individuals are existing to permanent housing options.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

Persons experiencing homelessness often require supportive services to make a successful transition into a permanent housing situation. The following efforts support individuals and families transitioning to permanent and independent living situations in Roseville. The City provides funding to most of these programs.

- The Roseville Housing Authority administers 75 HUD-VASH vouchers. VASH vouchers provide housing assistance to homeless veterans and veteran families, coupled with supportive services provided by the Veterans Administration. Volunteers of America also assists veterans and veteran families through the Veterans Families Program and Homeless Reintegration Program.
- The Transition to Independence Process (TIP) serves Transition Aged Youth ages 14 to 24 who are experiencing emotional and/or behavioral difficulties. Youth receive assistance to make a successful transition into adulthood.
- The Placer County Whole Person Care program provides services to persons who are homeless or at risk of homelessness who are high users of multiple services, including emergency departments, probation, mental health and substance use programs and social services to coordinate physical health, behavioral health, and social services.
- Advocates for Mentally Ill Housing (AMIH) provides case management, housing and support services to individuals with mental illness including homeless and persons at risk of homelessness.
- The Gathering Inn provides emergency homeless shelter services and mental health clinician services for homeless individuals and families with children.
- Volunteers of America Home Start program provides shelter, housing and supportive services to individuals and families with children who are experiencing homelessness.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); or, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs

Both affordable housing and supportive services are needed in the community to enable persons with special needs to live independently and to avoid becoming at risk for homelessness or at risk of institutionalization. The following services are available in the City of Roseville:

- The City provides funding for rapid re-housing to help at risk individuals and families to avoid entering a cycle of homelessness.
- The Roseville Housing Authority administers 33 Housing Choice Voucher Mainstream Vouchers reserved for households with a disabled family member, and 75 Non-Elderly Disabled Vouchers that provide rental assistance to make housing affordable even to households at the extremely low-income level.
- The Placer County Department of Health and Human Services, Adult System of Care provides assistance to vulnerable populations throughout the county, including Roseville residents. The agency provides mental health services, substance abuse treatment, in-home support services for elderly and disabled; and also operates housing programs for clients.
- Advocates for Mentally Ill Housing (AMIH) provides case management, permanent supportive housing and other services to individuals with mental illness including homeless and persons at

risk of homelessness.

- KidsFirst offers intensive social services and individual therapy to children and families with young children.
- The Transition to Independence Process (TIP) serves Transition Aged Youth ages 14 to 24 who are experiencing emotional and/or behavioral difficulties. Youth receive assistance to make a successful transition into adulthood.

Discussion

CARES Act Projects - The City is collaborating with the Placer County Department of Health and Human Services and the State of California Project Roomkey to increase the number of homeless persons in shelter, and to secure motel rooms and mobile homes for homeless persons and others who must be in isolation or quarantine to reduce the spread of the COVID-19 virus. Many of the programs and services identified above will receive additional funding from Federal and State sources to address the impacts of the COVID-19 virus, but this may not be sufficient to address the additional burden caused by illness, quarantine and isolation, loss of income, school closures and disruption of the food supply chain.

The City has allocated \$24,000 of CDBG-CV3 funding through the 2019 Annual Action Plan to provide funding to Placer County towards the Project Roomkey project. The City has also allocated \$50,000 of CV3 funding to Placer County Office of Education to provide subsidized after-school care for McKinney Vento homeless students attending Roseville schools. Additionally, the City has allocated \$250,000 of CV3 funding to provide assistance towards homeless prevention through the payment of rent and utility payments, which will serve two hundred households and keep families housed. The remaining CDBG-CV funds amounting to \$250,000 will also be allocated towards programs to help prevent homelessness through the payment of rent and utility payments. These funds will serve an additional one hundred and ninety-two households.

AP-75 Barriers to affordable housing – 91.220(j)

Introduction:

The most significant barrier to affordable housing in the City of Roseville is the cost of land, construction and financing. The City targets housing resources, including entitlement CDBG and State of California HOME funds, to the creation and preservation of affordable rental units and permanent supportive housing for low-income and very low-income households.

In 2019, the City completed a regional effort that updated the 2000 Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice (AI) pursuant to the 2015 AFFH Final Rule. The City shall continue to actively participate in the ongoing region-wide collaborative effort to improve fair housing choice and affirmatively further fair housing.

Actions it planned to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment

The following is a summary of the City's plan to address public policies that may impact affordable housing development as noted in the 2021 Housing Element.

- **Development Process.** To expedite project facilitation and provide internal support to project applicants, the City established the Development Advisory Committee to function as a liaison building relationships between the City and development community, providing input into delivery of development services, cost of services, construction standards, development impact fees, and other development service policy areas. The City will continue to review its fee system and work toward graduated fees as a means of reducing the cost of housing development. The City's Development Services Department works with the Development Advisory Committee.
- **Review of Subdivision Improvement Standards and Zoning Ordinances.** The City will review and modify its Subdivision Improvement Standards, where reasonable, to provide cost savings in the development of residential units while continuing to ensure the public health, safety, and welfare.
- **Public Education Program.** The City will continue to educate its citizens regarding the necessity of providing the affordable housing needed to support the job growth occurring in Roseville. Specifically, this information will focus on the need to provide affordable housing in close proximity to jobs in an effort to reduce the traffic and air quality impacts that result from long commutes. In addition, the City will continue to monitor community opposition to affordable housing projects in an effort to remove negative perceptions. Education will occur through public hearings, presentations to various service organizations, and other community groups, articles published in the local newspaper, the City's newsletter.
- **Public Participation.** The Planning Division will continue to encourage developers to meet with interested parties before the public decision making process begins. Preliminary

neighborhood forums allow persons directly affected by the project to have their questions and concerns addressed early in the planning process.

- Fair Housing: The City will continue to provide assistance regarding equal housing opportunities through its Housing Division and Housing Authority. The City of Roseville will continue its collaborative Housing Education Campaign to provide fair housing counseling workshops and one-on-one counseling for Roseville residents, landlords/property owners, and tenants, with counseling provided by Legal Services of Northern California through the City's Fair Housing Education Program. In addition to the provision of workshops and one-on-one counseling, the City's website includes fair housing information and referral service data with links to other Fair housing resources. The City has also contracted with Project Sentinel, a Fair Housing Services provider, to provide outreach and education regarding fair housing for both landlords and tenants of Roseville.

A goal within the City's 2021 Housing Element is to design and implement programs to affirmatively further fair housing and promote housing opportunities throughout the City for protected classes to address significant disparities in housing needs and access identified within the Sacramento Valley Fair Housing Collaborative Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice. Programs noted in the Housing Element to address this include:

- The Housing Choice Voucher program: Provides rental assistance to extremely low and very low-income households through direct payments to the property owner. The City's Housing Authority currently has 785 vouchers which includes separate vouchers for special needs groups.
- The Home Investment Partnership Program (HOME): Implementation of this program will be directed to disadvantaged geographic areas of the City, where there are overlapping factors such as poverty, overcrowding, cost burden, and poor housing conditions. HOME funds are used towards the City's Housing Rehabilitation Program, the First Time Home Buyer Down Payment Assistance Program, and Multi-family new construction.
- Density Bonus Program: The Density Bonus program helps promote and create affordable housing units. The program provides a property owner the ability to construct more income-producing units within the project that can offset the cost of providing affordable units.
- Specific Plan Areas (SPA): The primary purpose of the Specific Plan Area process is to guide the comprehensive urbanization of land use in a mix of residential neighborhoods, schools, parks, open spaces, supporting retail and public facilities, employment uses, and an affordable housing component. The Specific Plan Areas are the first step in implementing programs such as the 10% Affordable Housing policy.
- Affordable Housing Agreements: Implementation of the City's Affordable Housing Goal begins with planning of the Specific Plan, is established by the Development Agreement, and then when a developer is ready to pursue construction on a site with an affordable housing obligation, is affected by the Affordable Housing Agreement. The City shall require Affordable Housing Agreements for all housing projects subject to affordability requirements. The developer must agree to enter into an affordable housing agreement with the City ensuring a minimum of 20% of the units will be affordable to low, very low, or extremely low income households.
- Homeless Prevention and Rapid Rehousing Program: Consists of Permanent Local Housing Allocation funds and Low and Moderate Income Funds to assist Roseville homeless and those about

to be homeless with grants for payment of past due rent, security deposits, first month's rent, past due utility bills, and emergency motel vouchers.

- Homeless Outreach: The Roseville Police Department uses a Social Services Unit consisting of two full-time Problem-Oriented Policing Officers and two Homeless Outreach Workers from Placer County Health and Human Services to link homeless individuals to services throughout the County and to build trust with unsheltered individuals, particularly among communities where distrust is widespread and acts as a barrier to accessing services.

Discussion:

The City will seek to secure additional resources such as the new federal Housing Trust Fund and State of California bond funds targeted to lower-income households. Housing resources will be primarily targeted to the creation and preservation of housing for persons experiencing homelessness and those at risk of becoming homeless. Additionally, the City recently received an approximately \$487,069 award of Permanent Local Housing Allocation, which will be used towards homeless prevention and rapid rehousing.

AP-85 Other Actions – 91.220(k)

Introduction:

One of the primary obstacles to meeting underserved needs of residents is the availability of funding. The City actively seeks additional funding opportunities and will continue to do so when funds are available. The City collaborates with private, non-profit and governmental partners to maximize benefits to needy and vulnerable residents.

Actions planned to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs

Throughout the public participation process, the community emphasized the need for more affordable housing, shelter, homeless services, mental health services and services for seniors. The City will provide 2022 CDBG funding to programs providing rental assistance to persons who are homeless or at risk of homelessness, rehabilitation of housing for homeless and persons with mental illness, mental health treatment for homeless and youth, food and nutrition services for seniors, in addition to victims services targeted to low-income residents.

Actions planned to foster and maintain affordable housing

The City will continue to operate the Owner-Occupied Housing Rehabilitation program that provides CDBG funds and State of California HOME funds for improvements to the homes of low-income homeowners.

Actions planned to reduce lead-based paint hazards

The City's Owner-Occupied Housing Rehabilitation Program requires inspections for the presence of lead-based paint and the potential hazard such paint may pose to occupants for all units built prior to 1978. If the inspection reveals that a potential hazard exists, the City requires the mitigation or removal of the lead-based paint hazard in accordance with HUD guidelines. The City addresses the issue of lead-based paint hazards by providing lead-based paint hazard notices to landlords and tenants who participate in the Housing Choice Voucher Program, to all participants of the Housing Rehabilitation Program. Additionally, all rental units that are rehabilitated with CDBG or HOME funds are subject to lead-based paint compliance requirements. The creation of new affordable housing units and reduction of hazards through rehabilitation of older units provides low-income households with homes that are free of lead-based paint hazards.

Actions planned to reduce the number of poverty-level families

In 2022, CDBG funds will be used to support case management and counseling that will assist participants to access income assistance such as Disability Insurance, Social Security or Temporary Aid to Families (TANF); and employment counseling to obtain jobs, when possible, to sustain family wealth creation.

The Roseville Housing Authority Family Self Sufficiency Program (FSS) is a voluntary program designed to assist families to access community resources and achieve self-reliance through education, job training, and other supportive services. The FSS Coordinator establishes a supportive case management relationship with participants and provide guidance to help define career goals, identify and reduce the barriers to achieve those goals, and access resources that foster independence from public assistance programs. Participants are eligible for an interest-bearing escrow account for wealth generation as an incentive for full program participation.

Actions planned to develop institutional structure

The City actively participates in the Placer County Continuum of Care CA-515 (CoC) the Placer Collaborative Network, and the Homeless Resource Council of the Sierras (HRCS). HRCS is a regional planning group acting as the collaborative applicant for the Placer and Nevada County CoCs and documents the demographics of persons experiencing homelessness through the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS). Member agencies of the Placer CoC include: Placer County Adult System of Care, Placer County CalWORKs, The Gathering Inn, Volunteers of America, Enhanced Care Management, Whole Person Learning, Advocates for Mentally Ill Housing, Stand Up Placer, Placer Independent Resource Services, Project Go, City of Roseville, City of Rocklin, Tahoe/Truckee Health and Human Services, Sierra Foothills AIDS Foundation.

Actions planned to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies

The City relies on private, nonprofit organizations as well as for-profit developers to build new affordable units and to rehabilitate existing housing units. City staff will continue to work closely with these entities to ensure that as many new affordable units are produced as possible in each year, in addition to maintenance of existing affordable housing stock. The City relies on the nonprofit service sector to provide emergency shelter, transitional and special needs housing and services to special needs and homeless populations. The City will continue to support these organizations and their activities to the fullest extent possible
